

Hospital Wing Cornerstone Is Set in Flatbush

1,000 Attend Ceremony at Jewish Sanitariumto Provide 100 Beds

Cornerssone laying ceremonies for the new \$250,000 hospital addition to the Jewish Sanitarium and Hospital for Chronic Diseases, at E. 49th St. and Rutland Road, were held yesterday afternoon. An estimated 1,000 persons heard the open air program and visited the institution during the course of the afternoon. Nearly 500 patients are being cared for at the hospital at present, it was said.

The new four-story brick building, sijusted directly in the rear of the hospital, will have room for 100 additional hospital beds and other needed features, including an auditorium. With the structural and concrete work now completed, it is hoped that the building will be ready for occupancy in the Fall.
