Expect 3,000 to Attend Ball Of Jewish Sanitarium

First Annual Concert of Institution to Be Held at St. George on March 15.

Entering the final week of the campaign to raise funds needed to equip a new sixty-bed ward at the Jewish Sanitarium for Incurables, Rutland rd. and East 49th st., Herman S. Bachrach, president of the Brooklyn Bar Association, predicted that more than 3,000 persons would attend the institution's first annual ball and concert which will be held at the Hotel St. George on Sunday, March 15.

With his goal set at \$100,000, which is the sum needed to equip and maintain the new ward for one year, Mr. Bachrach, who is chairman of the sponsoring committee for the ball, indicated that he and his committee would make a last minute drive to reach the \$100,000 mark. The members of the sponsoring committee include Supreme Court Justices Mitchell May, Harry A. Lewis, Meier Steinbrink, Federal Court Judge Grover M. Moscovitz, County Judge Algeron I. Novak, Magistrate David Malbin, City Court Justice Alexander Geismar, Dr. Louis D. Gross, Harry and Fred Zeitz, Assistant District Attorney Ralph K. Jacobs, Murray C. Becker and Harry A. Leibler.

Governor Herbert H. Lehman, Mayor La Guardia, and Borough President Ingersoll will head the list of dignitaries who are expected to attend.

Reviewing the history of the sanitarium, Mr. Bachrach said that public support was essential to the maintenance of the institution, as it existed almost solely on voluntary contributions.

"The Jewish Sanitarium for Incurables, which at present cares for more than 450 patients, is the second largest hospital devoted to the care of Jewish incurable in the country," said Mr. Bachrach, "and its support is an obligation on every member of that race."

"Unless we can raise the required amount of money," Mr. Bachrach continued, "the institution will be unable to open the extra ward, and that will mean that 50 patients will be denied the care and attention they need so desperately."

Max Blumberg, president of the sanitarium, announced the publication of a journal in conjunction with the affair. The journal will show every phase of the work done at the institution, and will give its history since its founding as a 50-bed sanitarium in 1929 to its present 550-bed size.
