

Jewish Incurable Hosp. Cornerstone Laid by Max Blumberg; Names Enclosed

Following a parade that started in front of the Royal Palace, 16 Manhattan avenue, and ended at the structure, the laying of the cornerstone of the Jewish Sanitarium for Incurables, took place on Sunday afternoon at the building, which is in course of erection at Rutland road and East 48th street.

The stone was put in place by Max Blumberg, chairman of the building committee. He used a gold gavel to set the cornerstone in place.

The honor of having one's name preserved on parchment in a metal box in the cornerstone, was auctioned off by George M. Curtis, Jr.

Harry M. Peyer, counsel of the State Tax Department, presided. Rabbi Louis Gross of Judea Temple, Rabbi I. Sodden and other prominent personages were among the speakers.

They delivered addresses of a congratulatory nature, in which the members of the building committee and others who took part in helping to establish the institution, were lauded.

The need for such a sanitarium was described by several of the speakers. Reference was made to the recent killing at Kings County Hospital. It was pointed out that the organization of the Jewish Sanitarium for Incurables would eliminate, to an extent, this anti-Semitic feeling in so much as Jewish people in need of care, especially those who suffer from incurable ailments could, when it is completed, be attended at the new sanitarium.

Generous support will enable the Jewish institution to serve Jewish incurables, alleviating to a greater degree their suffering and hardships with kosher food and a religious and racial atmosphere likely to make them feel more at ease.

Names placed in the first cornerstones were: Jacob H. Cohen, who bid \$750; Louis Levy, \$500; Abraham S. Singer, \$500; Mrs. Max Blumberg, \$250; Mrs. Sophie Holman, \$250, and Mr. Curtis bid \$250.

In the second cornerstones were placed the names of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Fisher, \$150; Mr. and Mrs. John Klar, \$100; Mrs. Sarah Steckler, Mrs. Minnie Penemone, J. Posner and Abraham Posner, each \$150; Mr. and Mrs. A. Goldschmidt, \$300.

Rabbi Gross scolded the condition of the Chronic Department at the Kings County Hospital. "This so-called Chronic Department of the Kings County Hospital is a disgrace, not only to the community but especially to us Jews," the speaker said. He pointed out that Brooklyn was the largest Jewish community in the world, all million.

State Senator Lathrop Love said it was the duty of every Jew to help a movement to take care of the Jewish sick. "Jewish patients should not be left in the Kings County Hospital," he declared.

Among the speakers were Federal Judge Grover Moscovitz, Rabbi Elrick, Alexander S. Gelsmar, Judge Algonon Nova, president of the Brooklyn Hebrew Orphans' Asylum, and Justice Edward Latsansky.

They all urged the audience to give to their utmost because of the urgent need for funds to complete the institution.

Patriotic and Jewish tunes were played by the band that accompanied the parade.

The Jewish Sanitarium for Incurables is at present a structure three stories high. It has a bed capacity of 250. In the near future another story will be added to the structure.

This is being made possible by the members of the Bedford division campaigners, who pledged themselves to raise sufficient funds to cover the cost of the additional floor. Although the edifice is just a skeleton of what it will be, it is expected to be completed in the month of October. All the facilities necessary for such an institution will be secured for the sanitarium. The building will cost \$500,000, but on account of the donations and furnishings the actual money required is not more than half that amount.
